People see good/evil as true for all, not as personal preference.


People long for eternity and need meaning.



Predictions about Jesus

There are many prophecies in the Old Testament about the Messiah. Historians agree these were written hundreds of years before the time of Jesus. Yet they predict his life accurately. Here are 4 examples:

	Prophecy	Jesus' life
Place of birth	'But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clan of Judah, out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel, whose origins are from of old, from ancient times.' - Micah 5v2	Jesus was born in Bethlehem. (Matthew 2v1)
Family tree	'The days are coming,' declares the Lord, 'when I will raise up from David's line a righteous BranchThis is the name by which he will be called: The Lord Our Righteous Saviour.' - Jeremiah 23v5-6	Jesus was a descendant of David. (Luke 2v4-7)
Blood money	I told them, 'If you think it best, give me my pay; but if not, keep it.' So they paid me thirty pieces of silver. And the Lord said to me, 'Throw it to the potter'— the handsome price at which they valued me! So I took the thirty pieces of silver and threw them to the potter at the house of the Lord. - Zechariah 11v12-13	Judas Iscariot betrayed Jesus for thirty silver coins. Later Judas threw the money into the temple and left, and the priests decided to use the money to buy a potter's field. (Matthew 26v15, 27v5-7)
Gambling over clothes	They divide my clothes among them and cast lots for my garment Psalm 22v18	While Jesus was being crucified, soldiers gambled for his clothes by casting lots. (Matthew 27v35)







Are today's Bibles the same as originally written?

The 27 documents of the New Testament were written between 40 and 100 AD. Modern Bibles include footnotes to show where there is doubt about the wording of the original. You can check those yourself as you read and will see that very few words are in doubt, and nothing that affects any important beliefs. What we have now is almost the same as what was written at the time. Historians are confident about this for two reasons.

Firstly, the **large number** of early manuscripts. Although there are no originals, there are over 24,000 ancient copies (5,000 in the original language).

Secondly, the **closeness in time** to the original, with the earliest portions dating from around 125 AD and copies of most/all of the New Testament from around 200 AD. If that gap sounds long, it is worth comparing other ancient works such as Homer's *Iliad* or the works of Plato, Caesar or Sophocles. Modern scholars accept the authenticity of those others works, yet they do not even come close to the New Testament in either number of manuscripts or closeness in time to the original – as shown below.



Sir Frederick Kenyon, former director of the British Museum puts it like this: "The interval then between the dates of original composition and the earliest extant evidence becomes so small as to be in fact negligible, and the last foundation for any doubt that the Scriptures have come down to us substantially as they were written has been removed. Both the authenticity and general integrity of the books of the New Testament may be regarded as finally established." [F. Kenyon, The Bible and Archaeology, Harper and Row]

Why should we believe what they wrote?

The New Testament includes multiple independent eye-witness accounts.

John, wrote an account of Jesus, 3 letters and Revelation. He writes:

which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked at and our hands have touched – this we proclaim... We proclaim to you what we have seen and heard... (1 John 1v1-3)

Peter, wrote 2 letters. Early accounts suggest that Mark translated for Peter and recorded Peter's version as Mark's gospel. Peter writes:

we did not follow cleverly devised stories when we told you about the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ in power, but we were eye-witnesses (2 Peter 1v16)

Paul wrote 13 letters. Some are dated to 20 years after Jesus. Paul writes:

After that, he appeared to more than five hundred of the brothers and sisters at the same time, most of whom are still living, though some have fallen asleep. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles, and last of all he appeared to me also (1 Corinthians 15v6-8)

Luke wrote an account of Jesus and of the first disciples and their travels. He travelled with them and gathered eye-witness accounts. He writes:

Many have undertaken to draw up an account of the things that have been fulfilled among us, just as they were handed down to us by those who from the first were eye-witnesses and servants of the word. With this in mind, since I myself have carefully investigated everything from the beginning, I too decided to write an orderly account for you, most excellent Theophilus, so that you may know the certainty of the things you have been taught. (Luke 1v1-4)

These accounts meet the criteria secular historians use to assess reliability. For example, it was not in their interests to make it up. They were persecuted for their claims about Jesus. Execution and imprisonment was common. The writers include information even when it doesn't help their case or doesn't portray them in a flattering light. The names, dates and places fit what is known from other written sources and from archaeology. Their version of events offers the most comprehensive explanation of known facts.

Week 7. How can we keep following Jesus?


